An Initiative to Address Kentucky's Large-animal Veterinary Shortage

THE CHALLENGE

Kentucky's multi-billion-dollar agriculture industry is an essential engine driving the Commonwealth's economy and its future. High-quality, accessible animal care in our agricultural sector helps ensure that engine is strong and running. Our state and its agricultural sector, however, face a critical challenge.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has identified roughly 500 counties across 46 states that are experiencing a veterinarian shortage.¹ In Kentucky, 86 of the 120 counties are affected, according to the USDA and recent news reports.² The shortage is particularly acute among large-animal veterinarians and practices – an issue that disproportionately impacts Kentucky's farms and rural communities.

Contributing factors to the large-animal vet shortage include:

- A lack of coordinated training opportunities involving large animals;
- A dearth of recruitment, preparation and retention programs for rural, large-animal practice;
- The high debt load upon completion of veterinary school;
- Salaries that are not competitive with other types of veterinary medicine or other professional occupations; and
- Career burnout and retirements of current rural, large-animal veterinarians, as evidenced by recent news reports.

AN ANSWER

The following proposal—referred to as the V.E.T Collaborative—seeks to directly address the large-animal vet shortage in a way that maximizes the impact and the efficacy of existing programs, targets new resources in a thoughtful way and utilizes those resources in the most cost-effective manner possible.

The partners in the V.E.T. Collaborative—with a statewide reach—believe it is imperative that we work together with sister institutions, industry representatives, state government and policymakers, and other providers and caregivers to address this critical challenge.

THE REQUEST AND DETAILS

The V.E.T. Collaborative requests \$808,950 in new funding in the first year and \$1,238,370 in new funding in the second year of the biennium to support the following programs and initiatives.

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The V.E.T. Collaborative—representing the University of Kentucky, Western Kentucky University, Auburn University and the Kentucky Veterinary Medical Association—is focused in four primary areas:

- Building a pipeline of more veterinary students by reaching into the K-12 system to incentivize interest early;
- Expanding and ensuring access through more veterinary student slots and extensive student support efforts;
- Focusing attention and resources on large-animal practices in the state through scholarships, research initiatives and internships; and
- Investing in large-animal veterinary practices and practitioners through the creation of an accessible loan repayment program.

BUILD THE PIPELINE	 K12 Student Mentor Program – Collaboration with Extension and Ag Education to build interest in veterinary careers among rural students. Day-camp/Summer Camp – Focused on rural, large-animal veterinary experiences. Dual Credit – High school and college learning opportunities for courses relevant to pursuing veterinary school.
EXPAND ACCESS AND ENSURE SUCCESS	 Veterinary Contract Spaces – Expand program by five slots (each year) at established veterinary schools across the southeast. Bridge Scholars – New program for pre-vet students to build animal handling skills and training for success in veterinary school. Tutoring – New programs and resources for pre-vet students who may need assistance in undergraduate barrier courses (ie. math, chemistry, biology).
Focus on Rural, Large-animal Practice in Kentucky	 Summer Experiences – Designed for first-to-second year veterinary students to gain experience with large-animals in rural practices; helps prepare for clerkships. Rural Practice Clerkships – Designed for fourth-year veterinary students to participate in two-week clinical rotations in rural, large-animal practice in Kentucky. Research Scholars – Joint research programs to enhance rural, large-animal education and training.
INVEST IN RURAL, LARGE-ANIMAL PRACTITIONERS	 Kentucky Rural Veterinary Loan Repayment – Cohort of five graduates, per year, over five years, for a total of 25; option to renew a second five years. Joint Investment – The request is a shared cost between General Fund and Kentucky Ag Development Funds. Estimated \$2.2 million total cost over five years. Commitment – Enrollees make a five-year commitment to rural practice.

BENEFITS

- Focused on critical factors predicting rural, large-animal practice;
- Rapid response to begin addressing the workforce shortage;
- Efficient use of state resources matched by private, university and federal partners;
- No additional accreditation required; and
- No apparent statutory changes required.

BUDGET DETAIL

*The amount represents the cost of adding five contract spaces in Year 1 and an additional five contract spaces in Year 2 bringing the total number of contract spaces to 174 by FY2026. Kentucky's current investment in the contract space program is projected at \$5,828,560 in FY25 and \$6,061,768 in FY26.

PLANNING FUND POOL – Over the next two years, the University of Kentucky will commit \$500,000 to planning efforts related to the program detailed above. This may include, but will not be limited to:

- Exploring deeper academic partnerships and student/teaching exchanges with the V.E.T. Collaborative and other interested stakeholders;
- Capital planning and design efforts for potential capital investments in a future biennium;
- Ensuring the partnership addresses the unique needs of different veterinary practitioners; and
- Opportunities in research and clinical experiences with public and private partners.
